RISK SCREENING RATES

Florida's Risk Screening process and Healthy Start services were enacted by state legislation in 1991 with the goals of reducing infant mortality, reducing the number of low birth weight babies and improving health and developmental outcomes for all Florida's babies.

WHAT IS COMMUNITY CONNECT?

COMMUNITY CONNECT is the foundation for a system of care and provides a one-stop entry point for needed services. COMMUNITY CONNECT contacts, assesses, provides information, and makes referrals to home visiting programs and other community services.

Eligibility for COMMUNITY CONNECT begins when a pregnant woman or infant is screened and referred by their health care provider or hospital through the risk screens.

A HEALTH CRISIS IMPACTING WOMEN AND BABIES OF COLOR

March of Dimes

Data show that the U.S. remains among the most dangerous developed nations in the world for childbirth. Over 700 women die each year from pregnancy related causes, and the CDC reports that 60 percent are preventable. It is even more dangerous for communities of color:

- Black women are 3 times more likely than White women to die from pregnancy-related causes nationwide.
- Black babies are more than twice as likely as White babies to die before their first birthdays.
- Women of color are up to 50 percent more likely to give birth prematurely.

TAKING ACTION

March of Dimes offers a number of programs that seek to promote health equity for moms and babies. March of Dimes recognizes that implicit bias and stigma experienced by patients are potential contributors to the disparities in maternal and infant health outcomes. This year, March of Dimes launched an implicit bias training for health care providers with the goal of uncovering institutionalized racism in the health care system and training health care workers not to perpetuate the cycles of discrimination. In addition, the Beyond Labels website was created as a resource to raise awareness of stigma and work to help eliminate these disparities by addressing the root causes.
